

Mr. Haid

Marc Garneau C.I. welcomed three new administrators to the school this year: Mr. Di Felice, Mr. Haid, and Ms. Papadopoulos. For this edition, Bridget Huh interviewed vice principal Mr. Haid.

Q: How does Garneau compare to the other schools you've taught at?

A: Garneau is large. It's diverse in what programming it offers. The physical building itself is also large, so it's quite different than the junior high I was a VP at, and it's quite different from Leaside HS, which is where I was before I came here. Leaside was about a thousand students and there were two VPs. Garneau is about double the size. From the perspective of programming, there are programs offered here that Leaside didn't offer, which I missed when I was at Leaside, and I'm glad to be in a school that has ESL support. I'm glad to be in a school with diverse special education programs. I'm really proud of the TOPS program, I'm also equally proud of the Garneau program. And the teaching staff here is excellent, the support staff, the caretakers, the office staff, the aids, the social worker, child youth worker, everyone really works collaboratively and I really do believe that everyone's here for the betterment of students.

Q: As opposed to...

A: Well, as opposed to just coming and not caring. Just coming for a paycheck. I think people really do care about students. And they care about making connections with students. If I ask staff what they like about Garneau, the answer is often "I come here because of the kids," or "I like to be here because of the kids," or "I really enjoy working with the students." That's not to say that that's always an easy task, that it's always an easy job, but I think the students here really appreciate what their teachers do for them.

O: Yeah, I really like that about Garneau. I love the teachers here. Did you always want to work in education as a teacher?

A: Yes, I did. As a child, I always really liked to tell people what to do [laughs] so as a bossy person, it was natural to become a teacher, because you're always telling people what they should do based upon your frame of reference. tt

I didn't always envision teaching in a school necessarily, but I really enjoy working with young people—anyone, for that matter—and imparting what I know to them, but I also understand that teaching is a reciprocal action. I know that when I share what I know with others, that they're going to share with me what they know. And that's the beauty of the interaction of teaching.

One of my fondest memories was teaching a class of nine boys with very different approaches to school, they had different needs.

Uyghur Concentration Camps: Re-education or Genocide?

What makes the Uyghur repression particularly unsettling is the refusal of Muslim-majority countries to speak out against the CCP, implying their seeming support of the camps. Muslim nations are putting an emphasis and priority on their economic and strategic relationships with China, choosing to ignore the disastrous human rights violations against other Muslims. If physical torture, sexual abuse, and separation from family weren't enough for the Uyghurs to bear, now they must also suffer from the knowledge that their Muslim community has abandoned them. In July 2019, a group of almost exclusively European countries signed a letter to the United Nations human rights chief in an effort to condemn China's repression of Uyghurs [1]. This is all while more than three dozen Muslim states, including Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, do not partake in this response. Instead they do the exact opposite: these nations signed their own letter to China praising their "remarkable achievements" in human rights and its "counterterrorism" efforts in Xinjiang [1].

We often wonder how people could've been so passive during the Holocaust and other genocides, allowing unspeakable horrors to be committed right before their eyes. But that is pure hypocrisy. We must ask ourselves the same question when it

comes to the Uyghurs: how can we, in this day and age, turn a blind eye to the mass detentions of a particular faith group who have often committed no crimes except demonstrating religiosity. There could be nothing more ironic than the fact that the United States has taken the toughest stance on the Uyghur concentration camps, while the country itself, has proudly constructed its own concentration camps: "immigrant detention centres". Muslim-majority nations must recognize this as an issue that they must act on to resolve. Muslim nations such as Saudi Arabia and Pakistan, to name a few, should not turn a blind eve to the Uvghurs because of their economic interest in China's "Belt and Road" development project [2]. Perhaps they should be reminded of the Islamic value that is especially timely today: selective justice is a form of injustice. The Uyghurs are being repressed in camps for the same beliefs that many of these states claim to uphold. That alone should be the uniting factor for all Muslim-majority countries to take a bold stance on this issue. Unfortunately, it is highly unlikely that many Muslim states will give up their desire for quick coal and gas profits to fulfill their moral obligation to their Uyghur brothers and sisters. If this remains the case, then the most effective way for us to bring some form of relief for

the Uyghurs may lie, as odd as it sounds, with our star-spangled neighbours to the south. The United States should use its power to encourage its close allies, including Canada, to impose sanctions on China. The withdrawal of economic support for a nation may be enough to push them to reconsider their decisions: they must identify whether they prioritize the need to survive in the global community, or whether they want to continue their base behaviour in isolation.

As such, many students will try to stick to one department and avoid other courses as much as possible.

But are the social sciences and natural sciences all that different? When it comes to real-life applications, the social sciences and natural sciences are very much intertwined. Scientific advancements usually originate as a means to solve humanitarian problems that are initially studied from a social or political perspective. At the same time, certain societal and political issues cannot be studied without also taking into account relevant scientific facts. Thus, it is important for students to have a basic understanding of various subjects no matter what career they wish to pursue.

Often students feel pressured to pursue STEM professions because they're deemed to be the most respectable jobs indicative of an individual's intelligence and work ethic. Social sciences and the arts, on the other hand, are often frowned upon as useless subjects to pursue. A common misconception is that a degree in the social sciences is impractical in terms of job prospects. Consequently, many students choose to focus solely on STEM courses and only take social science courses required for their high school diploma.


